Dear Parents, Guardians and Carers,

Welcome to the end of Term 1! It has been a wonderful collective effort by all families, students, and staff to successfully complete the first Term of our Centenary Year of Education at Murtoa College. Whilst not without its challenges, all staff and students across F-12 have shown steely determination to complete this term's individual commitments and are now ready to enjoy a well-deserved break.

Education Support (ES) Staff

This week I would like to make a special mention of our wonderful team of Education Support (ES) staff. This year we have expanded our team to include former students (alumni) who are now assisting our staff and students in our library and IT areas, and in Term 2 will draw on the expertise of Education Support staff in our Flexible Learning In-School Program (FLIP) programs. From the commencement of Term 2, these programs will see a number of our Education support staff working with students, families, and teachers in two key areas: (i) FLIP I&E (Intervention & Extension) Tutoring program; and (ii) FLIP-HOL (Hands-On Learning) program. Both programs will be overseen and supported by our Assistant Principal and myself as we together do all we can to provide all our students with every opportunity to grow, be their personal best and experience success.

To further strengthen our FLIP-HOL team, we will also soon be advertising for a second industry (trade) Education Support staff member (non-teacher) to join our FLIP-HOL program (e.g. Automotive, Construction, Boilermaker etc.) in a full-time capacity. Term 2 and Winter Uniform

Assistant Principal's Report (Chad Frost)

In recent times, the issue of poor student behaviour, violence, and a general lack of respect in schools and within the Victorian community has become a growing concern, gaining much media attention. Addressing this complex challenge requires a collaborative effort involving schools, families, and the wider community. By working together, we can create a safer and more nurturing environment for students to thrive academically and emotionally.

Schools play a pivotal role in shaping students' behaviour and attitudes, but we cannot do this in isolation. Implementing proactive measures rather than reactive responses is essential to fostering a safe learning environment for all students.

We are in the process of implementing School Wide Positive Behaviours (SWPBS) across Murtoa College. The purpose of SWPBS is to help schools improve social, emotional, behavioural, and academic outcomes for students from Foundation to Year 12. SWPBS is a long-term commitment, 3-5 years to fully implement. Alongside the implementation of SWPBS we will develop and implement a behaviour management plan focusing on how we manage challenging behaviours using restorative practices model.

By adopting whole-school approaches that promote positive behaviour and social-emotional learning, schools can create a culture of respect and support that deters violence.

Family involvement is paramount in student behaviour in schools. Parents and caregivers must be engaged as partners in promoting positive practices and reinforcing the values of respect, integrity, inclusion, and community taught at school. Collaborative efforts between schools and families can bridge the gap between home and school environments, creating consistency in behavioural expectations for students.

Beyond the school and family unit, the broader community also plays a crucial role in tackling student engagement and behaviour in schools. By fostering a culture of respect and understanding within the community, schools can benefit from a supportive network that reinforces positive behaviours among students.

Marrung Program

The Marrung program is a significant initiative in Victoria aimed at enhancing Aboriginal education and fostering cultural inclusivity and respect. Murtoa College is committed to supporting the Marrung Vision by celebrating First Nations peoples' culture, providing individualised support for Koorie students, embedding Koorie experiences in curriculum planning, and acknowledging the contributions of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people within the college environment.

Our Marrung group came together for the first-time last Friday, attending Stawell Secondary College to learn from and with their students. Stawell Secondary students worked with our students to understand their own culture, to learn

indigenous symbols and to create their own stories through art. It was great to see our students engaging with others and developing their network. We will continue to expand our networks to provide opportunities for our young people.

Prior to our arrival at Stawell our students were taken to Bunjils Cave in the Black Range just south of Stawell. It is a significant Aboriginal cultural site with the ancient shelter featuring a unique painting of Bunjil, the creator-being in many Koori cultures, along with two dingoes. It is considered one of the most prominent Aboriginal rock-art sites in the region, with estimates suggesting that the artwork is over a thousand years old.

The day proved to be a fantastic foundation for ongoing work for our students.

Sport and Recreation

To bring VET Sport and Recreation to life, Murtoa College students are engaging in a comprehensive program that offers practical experiences, industry links, and real-world projects. By immersing themselves in these experiences, students can apply their knowledge in practical and real-life situations. Our program has a strong focus on coaching and this year our students will be working with Rupanyup FNC and Minyip-Murtoa FNC to support the implementation of Auskick and Net Set Go. Our students will work together with the support of club coordinators to roll out their session plans and develop their skills as coaches. Our class has also entered a boys netball team for the winter sports program coached by Lili Wilson, Marli Arnold and Isabelle Hemley. The girls are taking the male students through weekly training sessions to condition the team for competition, which is another key learning area of the course. The girls are doing a fantastic job and getting a strong understanding of the challenges faced by coaches.



FLIP-HOL Off-Site Experiential Learning

Industry excursions and volunteering play a crucial role in flexible learning programs by providing students with realworld experiences that enhance their learning outcomes and personal development. These activities offer students the opportunity to apply theoretical knowledge in practical settings, gain hands-on experience, develop essential skills like teamwork and communication, explore potential career paths, and build confidence. Industry excursions expose students to different work environments, industries, and professionals, helping them understand the relevance of their studies to the workforce. Volunteering, on the other hand, fosters a sense of community engagement, social responsibility, and empathy while allowing students to contribute positively to society. Overall, these experiences enrich the educational journey of flexible learning students by bridging the gap between classroom learning and real-life applications.

With the support of the Local Learning and Employment Network our students have the opportunity to visit the Tiny Homes Park nestled within the Grampians Edge caravan park. Dale and Katey Exon, the managers of the caravan park and owner/builders of the Tiny Homes took the students on a tour through the vans and took the students through a Q&A about a range of industries, owning and operating their own business and potential opportunities for our young people. Both Dale and Katey were great with our students and made no bones about their expectations of their employees.

From here we met with Lyn from Blaze Aid who discussed with our students the history of Blaze Aid, how it works and let the students through a Q&A. Volunteers cooked lunch for the students, engaged in discussions individually with students before leading them through one of the equipment trailers. The fencing process was discussed with students who will have the opportunity to volunteer alongside Blaze Aid this coming week.

On our journey home we stopped at The Wimmera Kart Racing Club. Our new FLIP teacher, Anthony Taylor, is an avid go kart racer and member of the club and discussed an array of karting nuance, future possibilities for our students in and out of the classroom. Anthony is a mechanic by trade and is an experienced metal and automotive teacher and will provide students with the opportunity to gain valuable industry experiences.

Exciting Developments in Agriculture at Murtoa College!

In recent weeks, our Agriculture department has been abuzz with activity. Our VCE students had the privilege of hosting insightful sessions led by industry experts. Holly from Australian Wool Innovations (AWI) delved into the dynamic landscape of domestic and export markets, highlighting challenges and the latest innovations in the wool industry. Meanwhile, Sam from Meat and Livestock Australia (MLA) shared invaluable insights into the meat industry, discussing its challenges and market dynamics.

Our Primary Ag Science students have been getting hands-on experience with nature's unsung heroes: earthworms. Through close observation and study, they've gained a deeper appreciation for the vital role these creatures play in our ecosystem. Additionally, they've embarked on the exciting journey of setting up worm farms and preparing our school garden plots for winter vegetable crops.
